Safety: a Winning Story

Congratulations and thanks! What you are doing IS making a difference and it's being noticed. But together we can still do more.

That was the message heard at the ASAP Awards Breakfast held during the Little League Baseball World Series week in Williamsport in August.

With over 86% of the country's local Little Leagues operating some form of self-directed safety plan, ASAP has never had more participation and has taken a firm root in helping to protect the players, volunteers, and spectators at baseball and softball activities in the US. The World Series breakfast honored those helping give ASAP this impact.

Part of that recognition was for local leagues raising the bar for safety awareness. Redrock Little League from Las Vegas, Nev. was honored as having the best safety plan in the country in 2010. Redrock's president and safety officer were presented awards for their

league's accomplishment and will be given a 200-foot Light-Structure Green™ lighting system from Musco Lighting for their achievement.

In addition, four other pairs of presidents and safety officers, as their league representatives, were brought to the LLB World Series to be honored for having the best safety plans in their regions. The leagues of Hopkins, Minn.; Felton, Del.; Capital Midwestern, from Charleston, W.V.; and Oak Ridge-Woodlands, Texas; all were honored for their safety programs' successes.

Injuries Reduced 76 Percent Overall

The number of local leagues investing time, energy, and expense to improve the conditions under which their communities play ball continues to rise, as new leagues submitted safety plans tailored to the needs of their players and facilities. With the determined effort shown, injuries have been driven down to their lowest levels in decades, helping to make Little League a program ALL parents can feel confident in having their children participate.

The annual reduction in injuries is roughly 76% of pre-ASAP levels, a huge decrease. But some leagues have never had a safety plan, or develop one and then drop its implementation in following years. These are areas local leagues can help their neighbors to improve on, by providing guidance to new leagues and assistance to create and maintain a safety plan in every league in your district.

That core approach, of local leagues looking at their needs to find creative and workable solutions, has not changed since the program was launched at the 1995 International Congress. Now in 2010, this grassroots effort has been responsible for protecting an estimated 60,000 players, volunteers and spectators from injuries since the program began, District Administrators and league officials attending the ASAP Awards Breakfast heard.

In 2010, 22 states increased their ASAP participation percents, while three states remained at 100%: West Virginia, for the

Redrock Invests in Safety Effort

This year, the president of Redrock Little League got what she has been working toward for several years. Her league won the award for implementing the best safety plan in the nation.

Valarie Walton, president of Redrock Little League in Las Vegas, Nev., has an infectious laugh and loves to use it, but she can be serious when it comes to safety. One example: Her league in 2007 implemented a local rule requiring that all volunteers wear a league-supplied badge with their name, photo, the league's name, and current year on it after they had passed their annual background screening. All Redrock volunteers must have their badge displayed to be on the field.

This supplements the Little League requirement that the local league check all volunteers who have repetitive access to players, or provide regular service to the league. Redrock Little League uses the LexisNexis criminal background check to ensure they have the most complete information possible to conduct their screenings of volunteers. Little League International annually provides all leagues and districts with 125 free background checks. Redrock conducted 247 checks using LexisNexis, or an average of over six volunteer checks per team. All regional winners selected in 2010 used LexisNexis.

"When we implemented the mandatory badge for our volunteers, to show they had gone through the background check process, I made sure all the coaches had theirs on. If they didn't have it on, I made them go home and get it," Walton said. "It's very simple: no badge, you're not allowed on the field." This allows the league to ensure all coaches, even practice coaches, have been through the screening process, so no person with a crime against a minor is allowed to be with the players.

For three years Walton has had her sights set on the national prize, a set of Musco Light-Structure Green™ lights

for one of her league's fields, and the title of the best safety plan in the country.

Janet Yee, safety officer at Redrock, is an RN and has worked on improving the training and education of volunteers in Redrock Little League as well as the overall safety plan implementation, using a common sense approach to safety issues within her league.

Together, the two improved the safety plan implemented in Redrock Little League to the point it surpassed all others, and was selected as the best plan in the country, not just the West Region.

First Place Awards Buy League's AED

In 2010, the Redrock Little League board ramped up their league's safety by buying a new automatic external defibrillator, to guard against heart ailments on and off the field. "We used the \$500 we won each year for the last two years (for taking first place in the West Region) to buy an AED that we keep on site, and all the coaches are provided training in using the AED and in CPR," Walton said. Players and parents are also offered the same training, and some have attended the course with coaches and board members, extending the number of people benefitting from this life-saving knowledge.

Because of their location in southern Nevada, Redrock not only has a lightning detector, they also have a new UV ray and a heat index indicator, to gauge when precautions should be taken to protect players and volunteers from heat injuries. Like the AED, the league used creative funding to purchase the lightning detector, using "web cash" from the balls they purchased online with sporting goods supplier MacGregor to fund the purchase.

Mandatory and Optional Equipment Provides Added Safety Protection

The league requires mandatory face masks on batting helmets for the Little League and younger divisions, and provides face masks as an option for the older divisions. Mouth guards and protective cups are recommended for all players, and information is provided to parents about heart guards to protect players from heart-stopping ball impacts, Game Face™ protective masks for

infielders, and shatter-proof protective eye goggles for players with glasses.

A comprehensive concession stand manual covers safe food handling processes and a daily checklist for opening and closing the stand. This was a new concession stand and a new addition to their manual in 2010.

Training a Key Component of Plan

The manual includes sections on first aid, listing symptoms of life-threatening injuries like cardiac arrest and how to treat with CPR and their AED, to sprains and strains, and cuts and bruises. The coaches attend training that discusses all these injuries and how to treat each.

Pre-season training also includes a Big AI (www.bigalbaseball.com) fundamentals clinic on proper playing techniques for the different ages and skill levels of players.

Their complex includes fields with both warning tracks and protective fence tops, to protect outfielders from fence collision injuries.

A three-ring binder with the new safety plan for all safety manuals was provided to coaches, so mid-year updates and rule clarifications could be easily added to their safety manual.

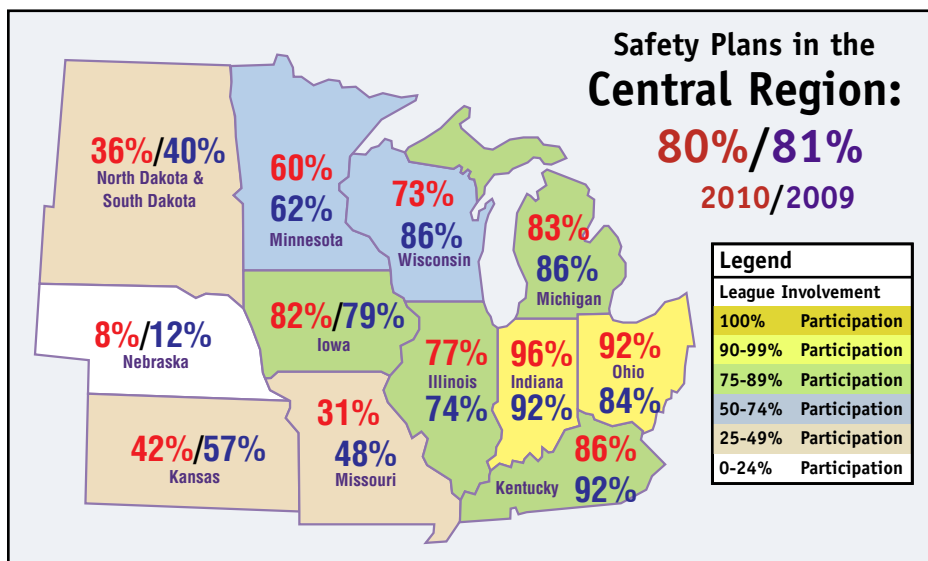
Coaches Rewarded for 'Doing Right'

The manual contains the league's active safety approach to everything from pre-season volunteer reminder dates to their program rewarding coaches who are "caught" following the safety plan rules. This program specifically recognizes coaches who: have catchers wearing dangling throat guard and all required equipment, don't have coaches warming up pitchers, don't have on-deck batters for Little League division and younger, have water available to players in dugout, have player wear catcher's helmet during warm-ups, and have team with clean and well-controlled dugout. Every coach so "caught" receives a pin, and is entered in a drawing.

Redrock uses the program to recognize those who "do right" and are helping to encourage the league's safety effort. And that's an effort worth recognizing.

Central Region Moves to 80%

In 2010, 86% of all Little Leagues submitted safety plans, helping to avoid almost 60,000 injuries since the program began in 1995. In 2010, leagues across the US earned over \$609,000 in league awards from Chartis Insurance. In addition, leagues having their safety plans approved early by the April 1st deadline, helped districts earn over \$52,000 last season. 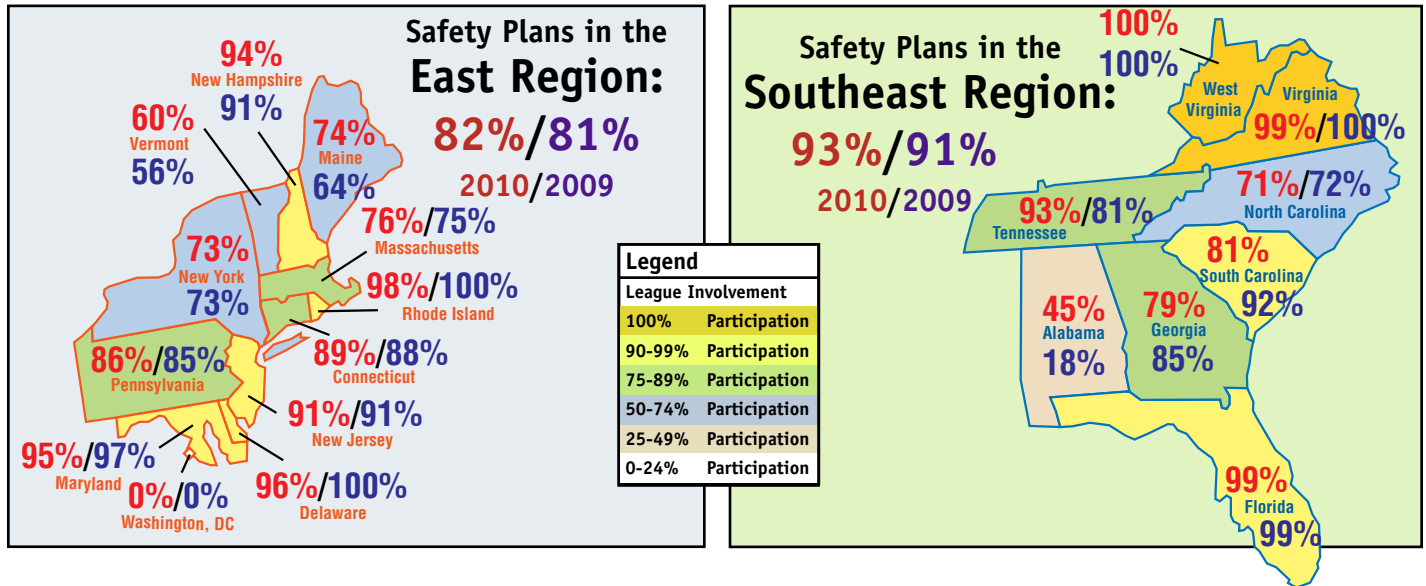

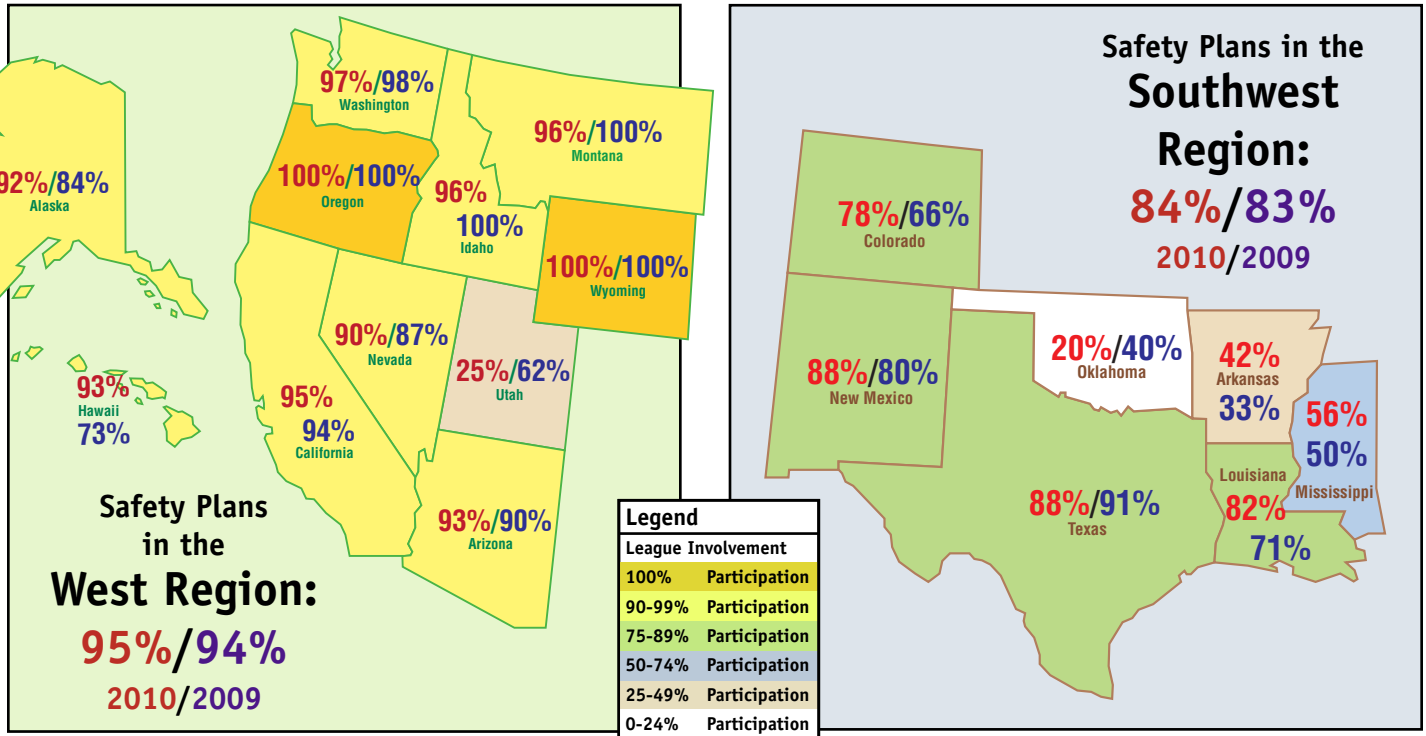
